THE IMMORTAL LIFE OF HENRIETTA LACKS

Her name was Henrietta Lacks, but scientists know her as HeLa. She was a poor Southern tobacco farmer, yet her cells became one of the most important tools in medicine. The first "immortal" human cells grown in culture, they are still alive today, though she has been dead for more than sixty years. HeLa cells were vital for developing the polio vaccine, and helped lead to in vitro fertilization, cloning, and gene mapping. Henrietta's family did not learn of her "immortality" until more than twenty years after her death. The Lacks family story is connected to the dark history of experimentation on African Americans, and the legal battles over whether we control the stuff we are made of.
